

## NWABA Provides Sports Program in Spokane

In March 2011, we started our newest goalball team, The Spokane Spin. The Spin is made up of blind and visually impaired male and female athletes from throughout the Inland Northwest. The team is part of the association's Sports Development Program which provides ongoing opportunities to blind and visually impaired individuals of all ages to participate in an ongoing sports program. Goalball is a Paralympic sport played by individuals who are blind and visually impaired. Developed after World War II as a way to keep blinded veterans physically active, it has become the premiere team game for blind athletes. Played competitively by men and women, it is a very fast paced, physically challenging, and exciting game. In goalball two teams of three players each face each other across a court nine meters wide and eighteen meters long. The object of the game is to roll a basketball size ball with bells inside over the opponent's

goal line. Your opponents listen for the oncoming ball and attempt to block it with their bodies. Once they are able to stop the ball and take control of it, they become the offensive team (USABA). The newly formed Spokane Spin has been practicing hard and hope to compete in several tournaments over the next year.

## NWABA Fills the Void Left by the State of Oregon

In 2009, the Oregon Legislature voted to close the Oregon School for the Blind. The closure not only impacted the nearly 30 students who attended the school on a daily basis, but it had a statewide effect on 800 other students who are blind and visually impaired who attended schools in their home community. From 1872 to 2009, the school was a hub of activity for all students with visual impairments in Oregon. The school hosted events and clinics for specialized sports such as goalball and they maintained the specialized equipment such as tandem bicycles that students had access to during the school year.

The Northwest Association for Blind Athletes has helped fill that void for Oregon students and has played a key role providing clinics to students of all ages throughout the state. They also provide the equipment necessary for goalball to regional programs in need so that they can continue to practice and hone their skills regularly. The association is the tournament sponsor for the new and improved Oregon State Goalball Championship held annually in March. They

have played a key role in bringing new athletic opportunities to students in Oregon. The association has brought new experiences to visually impaired and blind students such as tandem cycling and judo across the state of Oregon. This new partnership is only the beginning for both the association and students who are blind or visually impaired in Oregon. On behalf of all students with visual impairments throughout Oregon, we thank you Northwest Association for Blind Athletes.
